100 Years of Foundation

The mission of Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill & peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty.

How Does Foundation Achieve that Aim?

Your Contributions Fund Project in six important areas:

- Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution
- Disease Prevention & Treatment
- Water & Sanitation
- Maternal & Child Care
- Basic Education & Literacy

What is the Next Step?

Rotarians have a responsibility to actively support Foundation so that it will continue to enable good works over the next 100 years.

RCOB pays an annual levy to Foundation.

Individual Rotarians can contribute in many ways.

The easiest, simplest way of giving is to become a Member of the Centurion Club.
